Most people who have Alzheimer's or another form of dementia—particularly those in the early and middle stages—can be cared for at home rather than at nursing homes or other facilities. In fact, more than half of those who have Alzheimer's continue to live in home settings and 80 to 90 percent rely on family and friends for care.

### Help at Home for People with Alzheimers Dementia ...

People with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias are usually cared for by family members or friends. The majority (80%) of people with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias are receiving care in their homes.

### Caregiving for Person with Alzheimer's Disease or a ...

In a 2006 survey of patients with long-term care insurance, the direct and indirect costs of caring for an Alzheimer's disease patient averaged \$77,500 per year in the United States. Caregivers are themselves subject to increased incidence of depression, anxiety, and, in some cases, physical health issues.
